



The Trustees continue working hard in upgrading our facilities. This year's summer projects include more renovations, removing asbestos in the building, and upgrading flooring/ceiling/lighting. After ACDC closes for the summer, we will start the asbestos removal in classroom #125 & office #128. We will begin this project approximately on June 4, with the removal of asbestos from the floors and ceilings in these 2 rooms. This renovation should not cause much disruption in the day to day operations as it will be confined to the east-end area in the Education Wing. We would like to thank Casey Taylor, Director of ACDC, for her

diligence in obtaining a grant through the Nonpublic Aging School Program to help with the associated costs of the school project.

We will then move to the 2nd floor and begin the removal of asbestos from the floor and ceiling of the hallway. During this removal, there will be no access to the 2nd floor. Air quality tests are completed after each removal and the areas are not open until favorable results are obtained. Once all areas are open, renovations will start including, the new ceilings, lights and flooring. We are all looking forward to having new lighting, especially on the 2nd floor!

We will also be removing the asbestos from the ceiling in office #104 (Music Director) in the middle of all these renovations. We will install new lighting and ceiling in this room. During the removal a slight portion of the administrative hallway will blocked off.

We want to make sure that you are aware that there may be slight disruptions to these areas over the summer and we will do our best to keep the renovations moving as smooth as possible.

From the Finance Committee

Several years ago Indiana University's School of Philanthropy asked people why they gave. After collecting data over years and across that country and world, they reduced the list to seven "types" that give to the church.

Here is that list:

- Altruists contribute out of generosity and empathy. They believe that their church cares about the poor and powerless, the lonely and the lost. They have a generous spirit for giving that will do something good for individuals and/or society. It is a cause worth supporting.
- **Communitarians** give because every community needs to have certain things; a fire department, a rescue squad, schools, hospitals, and ...churches.
- **Devout individuals** give for religious reasons and feel that giving is a moral obligation. They simply want to have an experience with God. It is an offering to God, a holy act, based solely on faith.
- **Dynasts** give because it is expected. Giving is deeply imbedded in their family tradition and often plays an important role in family relationships. "Our family came to this church when it was founded, and has been a presence ever since. It is our responsibility to keep this tradition alive."
- **Investors** see their contributions as investments and look for the return on investment both for their congregation and their bottom line. They seek to secure the future through strong finances and/or to have a church for the benefit of future generations.
- **Re-payers** give out of a feeling of loyalty and obligation. They believe that they should give back to the communities and institutions that have contributed to their lives. "God, through the ministry of the church, has made a difference in my life, and I want to give back some of what I received."
- **Socialites** believe that giving provides entry into a desirable social circle. "All my friends go to this church. I'll become involved with them." "I want to be accepted by..."

So, which kind of giver are you? Which of these types do you feel most closely connected to? Maybe there is more than one category? I feel that this is a good list and one that invites me to study my own motivations to give to the church. I encourage you to reflect upon what makes you excited to give. The better we understand ourselves, the better stewards we become of God's creation and God's resources.





ASBURY CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER



ADULT SPIRITUAL FORMATION AND MEMBERSHIP Rev. Kristen Wall-Love, Director of Spiritual Formation and Membership



The spiritual practice for May is *Visio Divina*, or "sacred seeing." This is an ancient form of Christian prayer where we allow our hearts and imaginations to prayerfully engage with an image.

Here's how it works:

1. Pick out an image from a website, a photograph, painting, or icon. Nature can also be used as an "image." <u>I will be providing images via email each week for those who sign up, or use your own. Mark "spiritual practice of the month" on your connection card or email me: kristen@asburyweb.org to get on the weekly list.</u>

2. Look at the image and let your eyes stay with the very first thing that you see. Keep your attention on that one part of the image that first catches your eye. Try to keep your eyes from wandering to other parts of the picture. Breathe deeply and let yourself gaze at that part of the image for a minute or so.

3. Now, let your eyes gaze at the whole image. Take your time and look at every part of the art. See it all. Reflect on the image for a minute or so.

4. Consider the following questions:

a) What emotions does this image evoke in you?

b) What does the image stir up in you, bring forth in you?

c) Does this image lead you into an attitude of prayer? If so, let these prayers take form in you. Write them down if you desire.

5. Now, offer your prayers to God in a final time of silence.






